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Each article package must include:

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When an article is accepted for publication, the author will be asked to submit a revised version that conforms to the guidelines below. This version must be accompanied by original illustrations. A manuscript will not be scheduled for publication until all parts and permissions have been received and approved.

Abstract. A revised abstract, to be submitted on a separate sheet, that outlines the problem and conclusions should accompany the revised manuscript.

Acknowledgements. Acknowledgements and/or Dedications should be referenced by an asterisk at the end of the abstract and placed before the first footnote.

Spelling and Preferred Forms

Ancient Near Eastern Studies uses UK rather than US English; for example, '-our' and '-ise' forms, and 'artefact' rather than 'artifact'. Articles by authors whose first language is not English should be read and corrected by a native English speaker before they are submitted.

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- One hardcopy and one electronic copy of the revised manuscript should be sent to the editor. The hardcopy and the electronic must be exactly the same.
- The typescript should be printed using a 12-point size typeface on one side of good quality paper, with double spacing and ample margins all round for all component parts abstract, text, bibliography, figure captions, tables, and appendices.
- Each part is to be submitted as separate file and should contain the author's full postal address (or addresses if multiple authors) and E-mail address for publication.
- Contributors should also retain a copy of their manuscript, since the original will not be returned to the author.
- Chapters should always start on a new page. Each chapter should be saved as a separate file.

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- Authors should notify the editor whenever contact details change; offprints will be sent to the published address. Manuscripts should be prepared using Microsoft Word.
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Headings. All headings should be typed on a separate line and flush with the left margin. Primary headings should be set in caps; secondary headings should be typed in italics and title case (only the first letter of nouns and verbs in upper case); tertiary headings should be avoided, but, when necessary, should be underlined, and again using title case.

Bibliographical References and Footnotes. *Ancient Near Eastern Studies* DOES NOT use in-text citation, except for references to ancient primary sources.

Footnotes should contain short bibliographical citations and may also contain the amplification of a point, but the latter should not be lengthy. Full bibliographical details are to be provided in the list of cited works at the end of the article and not in the footnotes.

Multiple references to the same author

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Abbreviations. Abbreviations of references should NOT be used. The full title of periodicals and monographs should be provided.

Page numbers. Abbreviations such as f. and ff. for "following page(s)" are to be avoided. The full page references are to be used separated by an en-dash (–); do not use a hyphen (-) to separate page numbers, or numbers in general.

Sample references. The full bibliographical details to all books and articles should be listed alphabetically at the end of the paper in the forms below.

Insert a gap between the initials of an author: Nissen, H. J. not Nissen, H.J.

The use of the phrase *et al.* to indicate more than two authors is permissible in the footnotes, but is not permissible in the bibliography, where all names should be given.

Numbers and Dates. Spell out all cardinal and ordinal numbers up to and including 10, except where attached to a unit:

```
the third century, a third-century structure 3 cm or 5 kg
```

Numbers above 10 should be numerals, except at the beginning of a sentence, where they should be spelt out. If a number occurs in a phrase in which most of the numbers are above nine, use Arabic numerals for all:

15 sherds, 12 bronze pins, and 3 spindle whorls.

Write 0.6, 0.84, not .6, .84 etc.

Avoid unnecessary punctuation: 30 April 1956, not 30 April, 1956 or April 30th, 1956.

In numbers of four digits no space or comma is required: 4000, but 40,000.

For percentages use 'per cent' in the text and % in tables and figures.

Measurements. Use metric units rather than imperial. All measurements should be expressed with Arabic numerals and abbreviated units unless they begin a sentence:

2.3 x 3.5 m
Thirty kilometres west of the site...
```

Compass points. No abbreviations or hyphens should be used: southwest (not SW), northwestern, northeasterly. Do not capitalise, except for region names in common use (Eastern Anatolia).

Cultural periods. Names should be capitalised and written in full: Late Bronze Age (not LBA), and so on.

Transliterations. Transliterations of non-Latin scripts of names and words should be italicised and should follow normally adopted styles. The forms chosen should be used consistently throughout the text. The use of non-Latin characters is allowed.

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A list of figures with captions and credits, as set out below, should be provided on a separate sheet. Note that *Ancient Near Eastern Studies* does not use 'Plates'. All your illustrations whether line drawings or black-and-white photographs should be referred to as Fig.

Illustrations. Illustrations of professional quality should be submitted as clear black and white prints or as digital files. High quality laser prints are usually acceptable, but photocopies are not.

Line thicknesses and lettering sizes should be adopted to suit any likely degree of reduction. Avoid making lettering to large or too small.

If precise reductions are necessary, illustrations will be reduced to fit within 14 x 19 cm for the journal and 14.4 x 22.3 cm for the monographs.

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- If the illustration is reproduced with no change, note the reference source only.

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- 350 dpi for black-and-white photographs (Grayscale mode)
- 350–400 dpi for colour photographs
- 600 dpi for images that combine photographs and text (Grayscale mode)

Multiple line drawings, such a pottery sherds, which comprise one figure must be formatted to fit within 14 x 19 cm for the **journal** and 14.4 x 22.3 cm for the **monographs.** Do not clutter a page with too many drawings, but at the same time do not leave large gaps between drawings.

Proofs: Only one set of proofs of articles will be supplied to authors who should ensure that they are returned to the Editor within three weeks of receipt. The Editor reserves the right to charge for excessive corrections by authors. If author's proofs are not returned by the required date, the Editor's own corrected set will be forwarded to the printer.
